



SUNDAY MORNING ADULT EDUCATION IN OCTOBER


The seasons have changed and with that our Adult Education studies on Sundays after worship have begun again. Our first session in September was an insightful conversation about our ministry as a church in the world and as the congregation of Westminster.

On October 5 Molly Mechtenberg will be our guest speaker and will talk about Peace House, which is the winner of the 2025 Westminster Peace Prize. Beginning October 12 we will begin a 6 week study of the book *Hope Is Here! Spiritual Practices for Pursuing Justice and Beloved Community* by Luther E. Smith Jr. Copies of the book are \$14 but you do not have to read the book to participate in our conversations.

Luther E. Smith Jr. writes in the preface, "Hope enables us to be alive and responsive to the wonders of each day. Hope sustains us through times we welcome and times that trouble us. Hope reveals to us opportunities to experience fulfillment. Hope inspires us to love with our whole being. Hope transforms us and the world for beloved community" (p. x). This fresh look at hope draws on five spiritual practices that help readers to develop and embody hope in concrete ways. These practices prepare believers for "pursuing"

justice and beloved community." Join us for Adult Education beginning October 12 for six weeks as we learn more about "contemplative praying, prophetic remembering, crossing identity boundaries, transforming conflict, and celebrating community."

FROM THE PASTORS' DESK

Every once in a while things are said at the Wednesday morning Bible Study that I wish more people had heard. Last month, we were talking about 1 Corinthians 13, a familiar scripture to many. Two remarks bear repeating from our discussion. Nancy said something like: "I'd much rather be told, 'love is kind...' than 'let us love one another.'"

Her comment made clear to me why the "love chapter" is treasured by so many people. It tells us what love actually looks like in a way that resonates with us. We recognize it from the description because it does in fact reflect our relationship with those whom we love. We can see and agree with those parts that are true as well as those places we fall short. "Let us love one another" doesn't tell us how. Here's the full description:

"Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things."

(vv. 4-7, New Revised Standard Version)

We most often read these verses for weddings and funerals, but they're really for all our relationships. Paul can be so specific because he intends for the Corinthian believers to understand that they are not behaving this way toward others within the faith community. It's not actually advice for marriage or honoring our loved ones (though not irrelevant for those contexts). It's how God loves us and how God wants us to love others.

I use to think it described a love that only God was capable of, but each of the parts is not unreachable. We know many people who fit large parts of the description. And we can pick out the parts that each of us is good at and where we need improvement. Where you find this standard practiced, you find a healthy faith community.

In addition to our conversation about the concreteness of love, I talked about verse 13: "And now faith, hope, and love abide...." These qualities are essential for healthy faith communities. We practice them now, in the present. Not perfectly, but well enough that they shape our living both among one another and in relation to the world.

Paul is clear that our vision of these things is imperfect. "We see in a mirror dimly," he writes (verse 12). But he's insistent that the future of the church in Corinth depends on getting to work seriously on embodying faith, hope, and love.

I feel blessed to have experienced "these three" among you; in your curiosity to learn more about faith, in your compassion for the vulnerable in our world, in your care for one another, in your patience when I have failed to respond quickly or sensitively to your need, and in your kindness expressed through appreciation of the gifts I bring to this faith community.

Whatever health we've enjoyed as a congregation surely flowed from the practice of faith, hope, and love.

RACIAL EQUITY GROUP NEWS



On September 5 we hosted a presentation by Alyssa Stewart from the Kalamazoo Community Foundation about the RxKids Program which started in Flint and since expanded to other areas, including, this year, the city of Kalamazoo. We learned a lot about the needs and concerns this program addresses, including infant mortality and maternal health (of particular concern in the Black community), financial challenges facing new parents, and family

stability. We also heard about ways to support this effort. We discovered that there was something we could do immediately, as the possibility of making RxKids available to communities state-wide would soon be before the state legislature. So on our church picnic Sunday, we provided an opportunity for folks to write to their state legislators on behalf of children and families. Thanks to all who participated!

Our October meeting will be **Sunday, October 19, at 3:30 pm** at church. We will be making some plans for 2025-26 and choosing a resource or resources for our continued learning. We are eager to welcome new folks to participate, whether you can come every time or just occasionally. To learn more, talk with Cindy Green, Paula Schriemer, or one of the pastors. WESTMINSTER PEACE PRIZE

Westminster Peace Prize Awarded to Peace House

Our annual Westminster Peace Prize will be awarded to Peace House, a local organization that is dedicated to building community in the Eastside neighborhood of Kalamazoo. Through their summer camps and after school programs for children, they provide a safe and nurturing space with green spaces to play, creative activities, and help with homework. Volunteers are an important part of their program and come from our high schools, Kalamazoo College, and United Campus Ministry. More information can be found on their website www.peacehousekzoo.org. During worship on October 5, Molly Mechtenberg, one of the founders of Peace House, will join us to accept the Peace Prize and tell us more about their work. She will lead the Adult Education session that day. Molly is also the director of Hope for Creation, our local interfaith environmental group.

Peace and Global Witness Offering

The Peace and Global Witness Offering, one of our denomination's Special Offerings, will be dedicated on October 5. One quarter of the offering funds the Westminster Peace Prize to Peace House. The remainder of our offering is used to support peacemaking efforts by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the Presbyterian Church (USA), with a special emphasis this year on gun violence prevention and our denominational work in Washington D.C. and the United Nations.



The offering will be received throughout the month of October. Please give generously to support this vital work.

On World Communion Sunday, we celebrate that Christ's peace extends throughout all creation. Whenever the church gathers for worship, we are assured of Christ's peace. We celebrate that we are connected, we are loved and we are not alone. We worship together and are fed from Scripture and at Christ's table of peace. The pursuit of peace in the name of Christ is part of an active, engaged faith — a witness to what it means for us to be the Church, together. Through participation in the Peace & Global Witness Offering, our church is extending Christ's peace throughout our community and our world. We begin at the communion table, with our siblings in every time and place, and we celebrate the peace we find there and commit to building a more just and peaceful world.
