





"I am leaving you all my journals, but you must promise me you won't look at them until after I'm gone." This is what Terry Tempest Williams's mother, the matriarch of a large Mormon clan in northern Utah, told her a week before she died. It was a shock to Williams to discover that her mother had kept journals. But not as much of a shock as it was to discover that the three shelves of journals were all blank. In fifty-four short chapters, Williams recounts memories of her mother, ponders her own faith and contemplates the notion of absence and presence in art and in our world.



FROM THE PASTORS' DESK

Yes! It's May! I'm thinking about blossoms and birds and the sun's warmth. I'm thinking about art and poetry as the Art Festival gets into full swing. I'm particularly thinking about the artists and poets with whom we've been building relationships over the last several years. Since 2013, with the opening of our first festival, spring has been a season of hospitality for the congregation. We intentionally welcome strangers to our building to celebrate art, music, and the earth.

I love what Diana Butler Bass says in her book, *Grounded*. "Hospitality is the spiritual practice that saves tribes from tribalism, allowing them to open their gates and widen the boundaries of neighborhood to include those who wander by" (pp. 218-9). The Art Festival has provided a means of expanding our "neighborhood." Artists and poets are becoming a part of our community, helping us to bring the message of earth care to the larger community. This is one way we live out our intention statement by "engaging the world."

Being connected to the larger community is not a new thing for us. Westminster has always engaged the world through its service in places like Loaves and Fishes and Ministry with Community and more recently with our warming center. The art festival has taken us from an engagement largely defined by service "for" to a concept defined more as ministry "with." We're exploring together ways to be in the world for the good of the "neighborhood." It feels to me like welcoming them "home."

Bass writes: "Home is more than a house. It is a sacred location, a place of aspiration and dreams, of learning and habit, of relationships and heart. Home is the geography of our souls" (p.166). Our faith urges us to create places of belonging, where guests are active participants in the household.

Members, those who claim ownership of the organization, are important in any institution, but vitality and growth result from the open door that welcomes "participants." This is why we don't refer to those who participate in worship virtually as people who "watch" our service and why I think of "our" artists and poets as

participants in the life of the church. This is what stands behind making a good home. Again Bass writes: "making a home was a spiritual work of inhabiting new places well and knowing how to open the door to strangers – something not easy to achieve, but necessary to fill the ache that dwells in human hearts to belong" (p.165).

More than any other season, spring reminds me that I am welcome in God's world. I feel like I belong. My hope is that we, as a congregation, are creating a place of belonging throughout the year.

We have three people on the Board (John Best, Francis Cirvencic, and Jeanne Trompeter) and Leana Best is the longest serving staff member. We also offer their goat milk soap for sale in the narthex. But many folks have never visited the farm, so we are planning a field trip. We want to go a few weeks after the baby goats are born because there is not much that is cuter.
